

CERTIFIED RECORD OF LAND CORNER MONUMENTATION

History of original corner establishment:

Corner first established by Henry Meldrum in 1881, under contract No. 380, dated March 19, 1881. He set a basalt stone 18" X 8" X 8" in a mound of stones, from which a Pine, 9" diam. bears S.88°E., 57 lks.

D.M. Ferguson remonumented the Corner in 1972 setting a 3" brass cap in a 2½" X 30" iron pipe and setting new B.T.'s.

A pine 10" dia. bears N64°E 68.5 ft. dist. mkd.

A pine 32" dia. bears S55°W 58.9 ft. dist. mkd. T7S R30E S24 BT.

A pine 20" dia. bears N54°W 29.5 ft. dist. mkd. T7S R30E S13 BT.

24" D.B.H. Ponderosa Pine, S.88°E., 37.6', with scribes visible on an opened face.

10" D.B.H. Ponderosa Pine, N.64°E., 68.5', with scribed face, dead & down.

32" D.B.H. Ponderosa Pine, S.55°W., 58.9', with scribed face, snag.

20" D.B.H. Ponderosa Pine, N.54°W., 29.5', with scribed face.

Distances to Ferguson trees are to brass washer in lower blaze.

Description of monument and accessories | established to perpetuate the original location of this corner:

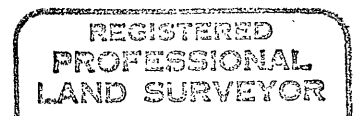
10" D.B.H. Ponderosa Pine, N.34°E., 80.9', scribed T7SR31ES18BT.

14" D.B.H. Douglas Fir, S.49°W., 36.7', scribed T7SR30ES24BT.

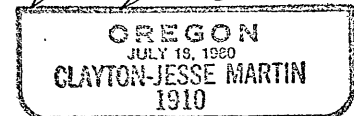
Set a brass washer mkd. RPLS 1910 between B&T on each B.T. and set B.T. tags, attn. signs, painted bands & faces red. Painted bands and faces on other B.T.'s. red also.

Distances are measured to center of tree 1' above the root crown.

Bearings are Magnetic North, 20° East declination.
